

My Definition of Leadership

Prior to writing the “Seven Habit of Highly Effective People”, Stephen Covey had researched what makes people successful. He then assembled the principles that effective people modelled into Seven Habits. He later added an 8th habit, the need to find your voice. Each of these habits could be broken down into smaller pieces that could be used to help individuals understand how to build the habit in themselves. He gathered data, used charts, visuals, examples, experiments, etc to illustrate these habits.

Assignment:

If you were going to write a book that included at least 8 habits that powerful leaders must have, what would these habits be? What powerful leaders would you pattern your research on? Make a presentation that explains these habits and gives examples of leaders that are examples of them. Show data, charts, visuals, examples, or experiments that would prove your habits are truly required for effective leadership. After you make the presentation send it to Mr. Nelson’s email account. You will present them to the class.
